

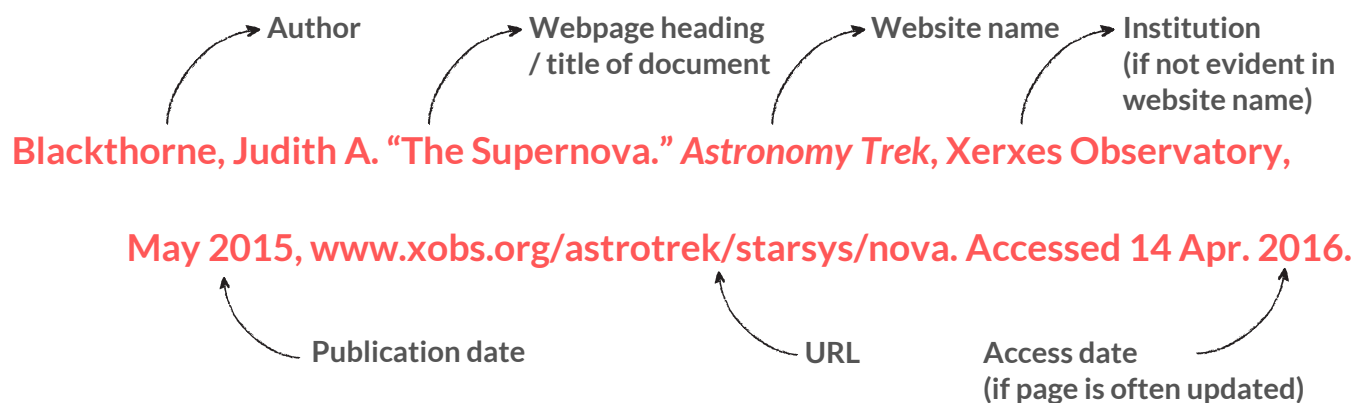
MLA WORKS CITED: WEBSITES

How to reference websites with missing publication information

First, determine what kind of online source it is. If it is not just a website but a specific kind of online source (such as a video, image, government report, or article), consult another handout.

If the source can **only** be classified as a website (for example, the website of a research project, an official company or organization website, or the website of a public figure), then follow the instructions below.

AN AUTHOR IS NAMED:



A WEBSITE WITH AN UNKNOWN AUTHOR

- The entry begins with webpage heading or title of a document.
- Break the URL with a space before a slash so that it appears on two lines.

UNKNOWN AUTHOR, NO HEADING OR TITLE:

- The entry begins with the name of the website.

IN-TEXT CITATIONS:

- Take the **first part** of the reference to create in-text citations. Page numbers are omitted.
 - Author: (Blackthorne)
 - Title or heading: ("Indigenous Heritage") Later citations: ("Heritage").
 - Website: (Victorian Women Writers Project) Later Citations: (VWWP).
