How to reference articles online or in print

When searching for articles online, be sure to identify **what kind of source** it is first. Is it a peer-reviewed, academic journal? Is it a newspaper article? A magazine article? A blog post? Is it trustworthy?

If it is only a website, not an actual article, see handout: MLA Works Cited: Websites.

BASIC FORMAT FOR AN ARTICLE FOUND ON A DATABASE:

Publication date Journal Page numbers Online database DOI or URL (if available)

WHERE DID YOU FIND THE FULL TEXT?

- If on an online database, cite the DOI. If there is none, cite the URL of the full text.
- Reference the database, not the vendor (e.g., Academic Search Complete, not EBSCOhost).

• If the database led you to an **exterior website**, then cite the journal or website, not the database. Include the **DOI**. If there is none, cite the exterior website's **URL**.

IF YOU ARE IN A DATABASE WITH A LOGIN:

- Do not use the URL in the browser bar. Use a DOI, if available.
- If there is no DOI, use the stable URL or a permalink. Dawson Library permalinks look like this:

A JOURNAL ARTICLE NOT FROM A DATABASE (PRINT AND ONLINE):

Online journals may lack page numbers.

• Do not include the URL for articles consulted in print.

Wong, Yu. "The New Elite." Business Quarterly, vol. 56, no. 9, Nov. 2013, pp. 6-24.

A MAGAZINE OR NEWSPAPER ARTICLE (PRINT AND ONLINE):

- If the magazine is published weekly, give the exact date. If it is published monthly, give the month and year.
- If pages are not continuous, use a plus sign (+) after providing the first page.

Lane, Anthony. "Why Movies Love Kids' Books." *The New Yorker*, 28 May 2021, www.newyorker. com/magazine/2021/06/07/why-movies-love-kids-books.

- Newspaper pages often include a letter indicating the section. Add a plus sign (+) for non-continuous pages.
- If the newspaper's name does not include the city, add the city's name in square brackets.
- Give the **full date** of publication, followed by the page numbers of the entire article.

• Online magazine and newspaper articles must include a **URL** in place of the page number.
